

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A MasterPLAN for your ideal outdoor living space

When it's time to turn your backyard dreams into reality, the hardest part can be visualizing the end result.

That's why MasterPLAN Outdoor Living takes a design-first approach. We recently sat down with founder Joshua Gillow, who has tips for anyone who wants to transform their outdoor space.

Q: What's the biggest challenge homeowners face when planning their dream back yard?

A: They have a hard time visualizing what it could look like. They want a pool, a patio, protection from the sun ... they know *what* they want, but don't know how to put it all together. We alleviate those stressors by managing the entire project.

Q: What should a homeowner look for when hiring someone for a backyard project?

A: They should look at the company's references and web site; verify the company's style and experience align with the project. Asking a contractor to design something out of their realm is a risk. You want to hire someone who is focused on a *design* first. Don't focus on square footage, focus on how the space will perform. What will the furniture look like? What will fit? Think about the entire project ... grilling, dining, and lounging areas.

Q: What's the first mistake homeowners make with their project?

A: More often than not, they're excited and just trust the contractor, and then find out the contractor has never done something like it before. The contractor is figuring it out as they go along. We've had to tear down entire builds because of major problems. The trouble is, homeowners are hiring *builders* and asking them to *design*. We're *designers* who *build*. We look at all the variables. For instance, steps: Can Grandma make them? What about children? We want to make sure you've considered everything.

Q: How about long-term maintenance?

A: The type of project materials determine the level of maintenance. In general, you pay more up front to save time later. Unlike many contractors, we are not beholden to any manufacturer when it comes to purchasing materials. Some people hire a contractor, and then four years later their deck is peeling. It's not that the contractor was trying to bamboozle anyone, but they were locked into a loyalty program and got discounts for using a certain brand. MasterPLAN suggests materials based on our experience with them.

Q: What should a homeowner ask themselves before starting a project?

- A: 1) What am I trying to achieve? Is it just a place to get out of the house? Or do I want to add value to my home and life experience? What should it look like to be a success? They don't need *all* the details, but should have the basics. Do I want rain protection? The sound of water? A fire feature? How many seasons will I use the space?
- 2) Are you looking for a Band-Aid to fix something, or are you looking to create an extension of your living space? Should it be simple, or wow your friends? How can you maximize your investment?
- 3) What is your budget? Come up with a range. Which pieces do you see adding value, and which can you live without? If you're setting the wrong expectations now, there will be heartache later.





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Surviving a home renovation

Homeowners invest large sums into improving their homes to make them more comfortable living spaces or to increase their odds of selling quickly. The Remodeling Futures Program at the Joint Center for Housing Studies of Harvard University predicted U.S. spending on home renovations and repairs to peak at \$327 billion in 2017.

Whether one is doing a large renovation or a small remodel, life may be turned upside down during the project. Furniture may be moved out of the room, walls may be demolished, water or electricity may be turned off, and appliances may be missing or not hooked up. Home improvements often drum up dust and disarray. Such projects can try the patience of any homeowner, and things may get worse before they get better.

Even though remodeling can be taxing, the end result is often worth it. Here's how to look forward to the silver lining and come out unscathed:

Discuss the project before it starts.

Do one project at a time.

Have everything in place ...

... but expect delays.

Plan an escape zone.

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








What to know about outdoor living spaces



Home trends come and go. What was popular as recently as a decade ago may have lost some luster in the eyes of today's home buyers. Though that's historically been the case in regard to real estate, outdoor living rooms are one relatively recent home trend that figures to have a longer shelf life, especially in the aftermath of a global pandemic during which people were encouraged to stay home as much as possible.

Real estate professionals and organizations like the National Association of Home Builders note the popularity of outdoor living spaces among prospective home buyers, and how that popularity has grown in recent years. Outdoor living rooms not only appeal to potential buyers, they also serve as a means for current homeowners to get more out of their properties. Homeowners mulling outdoor living space projects should consider various factors before deciding to go ahead with a project.

- Cost: The home renovation resource HomeAdvisor estimates that the average cost of an outdoor living space is around \$7,600. That cost can easily go up depending on where homeowners live and the features they want to have in their outdoor living spaces. For example, including a built-in fire pit in an outdoor living space will cost more than purchasing a stand-alone fire pit that can be picked up and moved. But many homeowners feel a built-in fire pit makes an outdoor living space even more special.
- Return on investment: Return on investment is another factor for homeowners to consider as they try to decide if they should install outdoor living spaces and how to design those areas. Much conflicting data about the ROI on outdoor kitchens can be found online, but many trusted real estate organizations report that such additions do not mesmerize prospective buyers. Data from the American Institute of Architects indicates that outdoor kitchens are routinely ranked among the least desirable home features,
- which means homeowners should not expect substantial ROI when selling their homes. But that built-in fire pit? Estimates from the National Association of Realtors suggest fire features recover around 67 percent of homeowners' initial investment. In addition, 83 percent of homeowners surveyed by the NAR who had installed fire features said they had a greater desire to be home after completing the project.
- Space: An outdoor living space may only be as relaxing as the space allows. The proximity of neighbors may affect privacy levels, which can make it hard to enjoy movie night outdoors or curl up to quietly read a good book. In addition, landscaping also may need to be addressed if drainage is an issue in the backyard. That can add to the cost, and drainage concerns may limit the materials homeowners can work with. Outdoor living spaces are popular. Homeowners must consider various factors before deciding if such spaces are for them.

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How home design trends are evolving for social distancing

COVID-19 has brought changes to everything, and home design is no exception. Experts are expecting to see lasting impacts on everything from the materials we use to the rooms we prioritize. Check out these and other noteworthy trends:

This means we're going to be investing more in our outdoor spaces, with functional kitchens, soothing water features, cozy firepits, and high-quality outdoor furniture to create a much-needed escape.

HEALTHIER SPACES: Thanks to spending more time indoors and reprioritizing our health, we'll turn to design to help ensure our homes are safe and healthy for our families. We'll see a rise in products like water filtration systems as well as materials that improve indoor air quality. For new homes and



additions, alternatives to wood-framing like insulated concrete forms from Nudura, which offer improved ventilation for healthier indoor air quality and an environment that's less susceptible to mold, will be key. Home office space: Business experts are suggesting many companies will see that working from home is not only possible but offers tangible benefits, like saving money on office space rent. With working from home on the rise, creating a home office space that inspires productivity will be a major project many of us tackle. Luxury home office furniture that feels chic and blends into your décor as well as ergonomic chairs and desks will see a major boost.
